

Please take note of the reminders regarding the tuck shop, grooming guidelines, and required stationery for the upcoming term.

- Tuck shop: With the current economic realities facing our country and the increase in the cost of goods and services, we have increased the daily spend of pupils at the tuck shop from NGN1,200 to NGN2,000 as of next term.
- Grooming and appearance: Please note that ONLY Year 11 pupils are allowed to braid their hair(girls) and wear their hair a bit high(boys) in school. All other students are expected to have their hair in plaits or cornrows, and off their face(girls) and a low and neat haircut without ostentatious styles such as 'fading' (boys). Pupils who do not comply will lose conduct points and may be sent home.
- Stationery: Pupils must resume with all necessary items and equipment to help with their learning. Blue, black, and red pens, erasers, pencils, sharpeners, a mathematical set, a 30-cm ruler, highlighters in different colours, and a glue stick(not liquid glue) are required by each pupil.

Thank you for entrusting us with the education and well-being of your children. We look forward to continuing our partnership in the new term ahead.


Highlights of the accolades include:


SPOKEN WORD COMPETITION





In today's digital world, our personal information is vulnerable to being hacked or shared without our consent. Our Data Protection Week which was held between 22nd and 26th January 2023 was geared towards bringing awareness to the importance of safeguarding our personal data, and measures to protect it.

We kick-started with an assembly for the children and incorporated awareness to all our PSHE lessons for the week.

Our parents were not left out! There was an online session on keeping children safe when using the internet with the help of parental controls. Parental controls can be a useful tool for parents to manage their children's access to technology and online content. However, note that the use of parental controls depends on various factors such as the age of the child, the type of content or technology being controlled, and the specific family's values and parenting style.

On one hand, parental controls can help protect children from inappropriate or harmful content, limit screen time, and provide a safe and controlled environment for them to explore technology.

On the other hand, excessive or over-restrictive use of parental controls **especially for older children**

can also limit a child's ability to grow and develop important life skills such as critical thinking and problem-solving and hinder their ability to explore and understand the world around them.

It is important for parents to find a balance and to have open and honest communication with their children about their expectations and boundaries.

A huge thanks to Mr. Ayoola for facilitating this session. His wealth of experience on Parental Controls on Android and Apple devices came to the fore! I am sure that the parents who attended this session found it enlightening and can attest that this was value for time. For those who missed the session, here are the highlights:



PARENTAL CONTROLS

Parental Control on Android Devices

Step 1: Go to settings on your device.

Step 2: Go to accounts.

Step 3: Family and other users.

Step 4: Add the accounts of your family members individually. Set up Microsoft accounts for the child/children. Here, you can simply use their email addresses.

Step 5: Click on manage family settings. This takes you online to manage the settings of your child's devices as you please. You can add as many devices belonging to your child as you want.

Parental Control on Apple Devices (Screen Time)

Step 1: Go to system preferences on your settings


Step 2: Go to screen Time

Step 3: You must have set up an iCloud account for your child. You need to have an individual account for each of your children. When you buy them a device, ensure you log them in using their unique iCloud account.

Step 4: Enrol your child as part of your family setup using the account. Ensure you do this registration using the actual age of the child.

Step 5: Click on your child's account and manage your child's devices: downtime, app usage, communication limits, etc.






INVITATIONAL RELAY




